Tentura

Tentura is now one of the most famous liqueurs. With roots dating back to the Venetian era, the trademark drink of Patras, uniquely closes a good meal as a digestive drink. It has been produced in a special traditional way in the wider Patras area since the mid-19th century.



Lukumi

Loukoumia, along with the tentura, is the trademark of Patras. Loukoumia are small cubes made of natural ingredients, often containing almonds, with a special aroma and velvety texture. The history of loukoumi in Patras dates back to 1850



Maurodaphne

is one of the most famous varieties of the Greek vineyard and has been associated with Patras and Achaia Claus. It is named after the dark, beautiful, black-eyed, Greek fiancée of Gustavus Klaus, founder of Achaia Claus, Daphne, who died young. Mavrodaphne is black in colour and is produced from a variety of red grapes. When it ripens, it has a very special aroma.
